
Finding Full-Text Online Access for Journals in the UMass Amherst Libraries

Method One: Publication Finder

- 1. Go to the Libraries' main page at https://www.library.umass.edu/.
- 2. On the same line as Libraries, select Find & Borrow and then click on Ejournals.




3. This brings you to **Publication Finder**, which is our interface from EBSCO that allows you to search to see if we have full-text online access to a journal across our many different databases and subscriptions.

Science

4. For the journal *Science*, type *Science* in the search field and then click on the magnifying glass icon to search.




5. The first result in this search is the journal *Science*. As you can see, we have access to *Science* through different databases. The date ranges for access are in a smaller font below the name of the database.



- 6. When you click on one of these databases, you will be asked to log in with your NetID and password if you were not already logged in.
- 7. Databases from different vendors will have differing interfaces and functionality. In this case, there is full text from 1880 to the most recent issue available through the American Association for the Advance of Science (AAAS). If you select the JSTOR Life Sciences Archive Collection, you can search all journal issues, but there is delay on providing full text for 6 years. This means that the last six years of issues will be abstracts only. That is due to the agreement that the journal made with JSTOR to provide content through JSTOR.
- 8. Given the above, it makes sense to click on the **Association for the Advance of Science (AAAS)** link for full-text access to the present. When you do so, you may be prompted to log in with your NetID and password.


9. Once you're in the **AAAS** interface, you can see the most recent year's issues of *Science*. You can click on each issue to access the PDFs or use the dates listed above the issues to navigate to the issue that you want.




10. If you'd like to search within the *Science* publication, go to the black bar on the top and click on the magnifying glass icon to the right of the UMass Amherst Libraries logo.



11. In the search interface, type the name of the article and change **Searching** from *Anywhere* to *Science*. Click **Search**.




12. This will then show results for the search, and you can click on the relevant article.




Science News


1. For the journal *Science News*, type *Science News* in the search field and then click on the magnifying glass icon to search.




 There are many databases that contain Science News. Most of the databases have full text coverage up to 2015 or 2016. Scroll down towards the end of the list to find the two that have data ranges to the present, which are Academic Search Premier and Flipster.



3. **Academic Search Premier** is the better option if you'd like to search through the publication. If you click on it, you'll see this interface, which allows you to browse by issue or search the full publication.



4. **Flipster** is helpful if you'd like to read an issue in a magazine interface. It's much harder to use this interface to try to search through the full publication.




Method Two: Discovery Search


1. Go to the Libraries' main page at https://www.library.umass.edu/. At some point in this process, you may be prompted to log in with your NetID and password.


2. In the main search box, type *JN "Science"* (including the quotes) and **Search**. Do not change the search to eJournals. Please leave it as Discovery Search.




3. You will then see this as the first result on the results page:



4. Click on the journal's name (bold font and blue).




5. This brings you to the page for the journal. Click on **Full Text Access**. This gives you the same list as Step 5 in Method One above. Follow those instructions to access the journal.



Science News

1. Use the same steps for Method Two, only change the search name to *JN "Science News"* (keep the quotes).



Notes

Please note that when using Method Two, you will sometimes you need to use the full name of the journal.

For instance:

- For Developmental Biology, you would need to search for JN "Developmental Biology: An official journal of the Society for Developmental Biology"
- For Biological Bulletin, you would need to search for JN "The Biological Bulletin"

If you are not sure what the full name of the journal may be, try searching in Discovery Search for an article that you know is in the journal. The result for the article will list the journal's full name.
